The above-referenced commodity jurisdiction (CJ) request has been voided and is being **RETURNED WITHOUT ACTION** for the following reasons:

- The CJ request does not contain enough technical information regarding the design, development, or description of your product to allow for a comprehensive technical analysis and national security review. The DS 4076 does not provide sufficient information for a technical analysis of your product.
- You must provide, blue prints, brochures, or other detailed schematics and descriptions of your products in order for a technical analysis to be conducted. If the battery is designed for a submarine, what will be its configuration?

## Accordingly:

 Provide quantitative data to include materials used, specifications, pictures and/or diagrams, dimensions, product brochures, and intended applications, as well as possible applications in submarines.

## In Reply refer to DDTC Case CJ 554-14

- Provide information on electrolytes, anode materials/configuration, or shape; its electrical capacity, whether it can be recharged, and, if so, how its performance degrades after multiple recharges.
- Provide information on the ruggedization of the battery to meet military environments. What performance requirements and characteristics is the design to be based on?
- Please re-submit your CJ request with the required information as supporting documentation, including the rationale regarding why a CJ determination is necessary.

All documents and information provided will be shared only with the required government agencies, no information other than that identified in Block 5 will be released to the public.
